Recently, I had to travel within the region to retake an exam. Travelling to that appointment I survived three near accidents on the snowy highway!

The experience was traumatic.

Why does the system not decentralize the process of permanent residence applications?

How can the process be improved?

Surely we could review it and avoid stressful trips, hotel expenses, and we could save time even speed-up the process, etc ...
