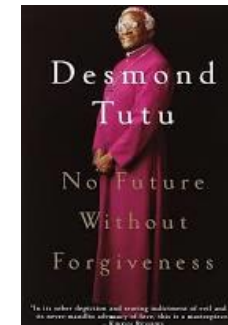
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growth, development and integration. I can testify to that.
